Site Locations

Adelaide – Trott Park Creek is a beautiful suburban creek with ecologically significant vegetation communities.

Auckland - The Whenua Rangitira site feeds into the Orakei Basin and Waitemata Harbour and is being returned to its natural state.

Bathurst – Jordan Creek is in Blayney Road Reserve and contains the important Box Gum Grassy Woodland.

Brisbane – Toowong Milton Scout Camp is located in a crucial part of the Moreton Bay catchment.

Canberra - Wandiyali Restoration Conservation Area contains a mix of important habitats for local species.

Darwin - McMinn's Lagoon is an important feature in a network of wetlands across the region.

Hobart - The old Lauderdale landfill site is surrounded by saltmarshes and bushland and is home to the endangered Swift Parrot.

Mackay – De Molelyn Lagoon is a beautiful freshwater lagoon in the picturesque Pioneer Valley.

Melbourne – W. James Whyte Reserve is former agricultural land being transformed into a conservation reserve.

Newcastle - Tomago Wetland is a 450 hectare wetland located within the Hunter Wetlands National Park.

Perth - Woodman Point Regional Park is on northern most part of Cockburn Sound with a unique coastline and the most extensive stands of Rottneest cypress.

Sydney - Sydney Olympic Park supports over 200 species of native birds, frogs, bats, possums and lizards, and contains over 300 hectares of threatened species habitat and is a hot spot for all things natural.

Townsville - Cape Pallarenda Conservation Park is north of Townsville and offers spectacular coastal habitats.

Wellington – Central Park is a popular park and hosts a rich diversity of rare and endangered bird species.
